## From the Town Manager's Office

In the past couple of years, the Town of Brownsburg has undertaken many projects to improve traffic and make pedestrian travel easier. Did you know that the Town pays just 20 percent of construction costs on many of those improvements? Town administration has pursued and secured more than \$38 million in federal funds from the Metropolitan Planning Organization (MPO) for projects between FY 2012 to FY 2021.

Recently, the MPO recommended four new projects for funding: the B&O Trail Tunnel Crossing on CR 300 North (\$736,000); Pedestrian Crosswalk Safety & Visibility Around Schools (\$549,720); Tilden Rd. & Odell St. Roundabout (\$2,244,880); and the Hornaday Road & Airport Road Roundabout (\$2,116,000). The federal funding on these projects, two planned for FY 2020 and two in FY 2021, totals more than \$5.6 million.

The B&O Trail Tunnel will allow trail users to safely travel north and south of County Road 300N, east of E. Northfield Drive, without crossing traffic at this very busy area. With the anticipated increase in vehicle traffic on the CR 300N corridor, the Town is planning several improvements along the road, including a roundabout at S. Green Street & CR 300N.

The Town has worked with the School Corporation to identify areas of concern and intersections with poor visibility along walking routes for school-aged children. The Pedestrian Crosswalk Safety and Visibility project will address visibility of crosswalks, visibility of pedestrians in darkness, safety at uncontrolled intersections, and ADA accessibility issues at 12 intersections/crosswalks.

The intersection at Tilden and Odell will be converted into a roundabout to improve traffic safety, reduce delays, and accommodate growth in the area bordered by Brown Elementary, Christ Lutheran Church, Eagle Elementary, White Lick Elementary and Brownsburg High School. The roundabout will be a "complete street" design that includes sidewalks and/or multi-use paths to accommodate the schools and neighborhoods.

A roundabout will replace the 4-way stop at the Airport and Hornaday roads intersection, which is bordered by schools and the future Cardinal Park just south of the area. With heavy school traffic and school buses, the project will significantly improve traffic conditions and reduce delays. *Cont. on page 2*

## Town Achieves Tree City USA Designation

Brownsburg achieved Tree City USA recognition by meeting the program's four requirements: a tree board or department, a tree care ordinance, an annual community forestry budget of at least \$2 per capita, and an Arbor Day observance and proclamation. Brownsburg Parks led the Town's pursuit of the designation and serves as the tree board.

A street tree inventory and urban forest management plan was completed in 2012 with the assistance of an Indiana Department of Natural Resources grant to identify the current conditions and maintenance needs of the Town's trees as well as opportunities for new plantings.

Parks Department grounds laborer Kris Myers is a certified arborist and works with other Town departments on how we will care for trees under their jurisdiction.

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## Town Council Appoints Boards & Commissions Members

Brownsburg Town Council re-elected Ashley Bacsu as council president and Dennis Dawes as vice-president for 2016.

Dawes will be the council liaison on the Brownsburg Police Commission and Sean Benham will represent the Town on the Hendricks County Economic Development Partnership. New council members Brian Jessen will serve on the Fire Territory executive board and Chris Worley will continue on the Advisory Plan Commission.

Claire Rutledge and Mark Tieken will be new faces on the Advisory Plan Commission. Joe Dunbar and Robert McLaughlin will serve on the Economic Development Commission.

Richard Holmes was appointed to the Police Commission and Brett Scowden was reappointed to the Board of Zoning Appeals.

The Redevelopment Commission will be composed of reappointment Matthew Browning, Michelle Artmeier, Matt Simpson, Joe Hornett, Troy Austin, and Brownsburg School Corporation representative Phil Utterback. EDC member McLaughlin, RDC member Artmeier, Plan Commission member Tieken, and resident Randall Hackworth will make up the Brownsburg Improvement Committee.

Ken McGee and Hackworth will serve on the Park Impact Fee Review Board. Charlie Lawrence will join the Northfield at Wynne Farms Advisory Board along with reappointments Don Peoples, Jay Puckett, Lori Young and Jennifer Knox.

Tieken, Rutledge, Joe Almon, Frank Lamar, Kevin Koonce, Jeff Ball, Travis Tschaenn, Chris Snodderley, and Eric Spoonamore will make up the Town Manager's Advisory Board.

Town Council and Brownsburg boards and commissions meetings are held regularly at Town Hall, 61 N. Green Street, and are open to the public. Live video of the meetings is streamed on the internet and archived on the website.

Brownsburg Town Council passed the Tree Care Ordinance in 2015 and at least \$2 per capita is budgeted each year for the planting, care and removal of trees within Town limits.

Brownsburg Parks Department observes Arbor Day by going into the schools to educate classes on the importance of trees and provides saplings to the children to plant. Each year the Town Council does a proclamation recognizing the last Friday in April as Arbor Day for our community.

Started in 1976, the Tree City USA program, sponsored by the Arbor Day Foundation, in partnership with the U.S. Forest Service and the National Association of State Foresters is celebrating its 40th Anniversary this year. The Arbor Day Foundation is a million member nonprofit conservation and education organization with the mission to inspire people to plant, nurture, and celebrate trees.

## Clean-up and Recycling Events Set for April

With the arrival of spring, you might be doing some cleaning to freshen up a home that's been closed up all winter. If you're getting rid of items, take advantage of the Town of Brownsburg's One Stop Drop Off and the Hendricks County Solid Waste Management District's Tox-Away Day on Saturday, April 9.



Residents and businesses can safely dispose of batteries, computers, office equipment, appliances, electronics and other items at the One Stop Drop Off from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. at the Brownsburg Fleet Maintenance Facility, 221 S. Mardale Drive.

Paper shredding **will** be available at this event. There is a \$5 processing fee for computer monitors and TVs. Please note that toxic chemicals, paint, oil, furniture, mattresses and wood will **not** be accepted. Get rid of chemicals, thermometers and light bulbs that contain mercury, batteries, fire extinguishers, and unwanted medicines at the Tox-Away Day from 8 a.m. to 1 p.m. at Brownsburg High School. On Saturday April 16, households, civic groups, HOAs and other organizations can team up to combat litter in our community during the Hendricks County Partnership for Water Quality's annual Spring Clean-up. ## Capital Projects Update

### Southside (Tilden)

**Drainage:** Construction on the combined sewer and stormwater separation along Tilden Road from the western Town limits to Jefferson Street should be complete in July.



The \$5.2 million project includes a new storm main line, new sewer and water lines, road reconstruction, curbs, gutter, and sidewalk replacement. Maxine Manor, Alpha Avenue, Locust Lane, Saratoga Drive, and Sunnybrook Drive will also get improvements.

**N. Green/I-74 Gateway:** Phase III of the gateway project includes a trail from in front of the medical office extending under the I-74 overpass on the east side of N. Green Street and connecting to the sidewalk at Crew Car Wash. The plan also includes landscaping north of the overpass, overhead lighting and a potential recreational trail northeast to Whittington Estates. The \$500,000 project bids this spring with construction this summer.

**CR 900E Water Main Loop Phase III:** This is the last section of the water main loop that started in 2014 to increase flow and pressure to the growing northeast side of Town. A new water main will be installed on CR 900E from Motorsports Way south to an existing main near Creekside Commons. The project should be ready to bid this summer with construction complete by year's end.

### CR 300N and S. Green Roundabout:

Utility relocation is underway for a \$1.4 million roundabout delayed from last summer by wet weather. Construction is expected to start in May and take approximately 60 days to complete. The Town will be closing S. Green Street at the intersection and traffic will be detoured to the east for the duration of the construction to save both time and money.

**Street Resurfacing:** The Town will conduct \$2.3 million in street resurfacing projects this year, which includes \$1.15 million carried over from FY 2015. Streets to be resurfaced will include S. Green Street from Airport Road to the southern Town limits, and parts of Hufford Street, Odell, and CR 900E.

## Brownsburg Farmers Market Starts June 2

Shoppers will enjoy locally grown produce, artisan baked goods, handcrafted items and more when the Brownsburg Farmers Market presented by IU Health West Hospital returns to the Town Hall Green this summer. Voted as the “Best of Hendricks County” three years running, the market is open 4 to 7 p.m. Thursdays, June 2 through September 8.

The Brownsburg Farmers Market is WIC and SNAP certified. Families who receive WIC nutrition program or SNAP benefits can purchase healthy and locally-produced fresh items with their vouchers. A partnership with Fresh Bucks allows SNAP participants to double their benefits up to \$20 purchasing locally grown produce at the market. Several vendors also participate in WIC.

Growers, producers, bakers, and artisans in Hendricks and adjacent counties are eligible. The fee is \$10 weekly or \$75 for the full season. ## Council Adopts Events on Town Property Policy

Brownsburg Town Council approved a new policy and application process for public events held on Town property. Because the number of requests to use Town of Brownsburg property for special events continues to increase, the administration saw the need for establishing consistent guidelines and a centralized process for handling those requests.

At least 55 public events organized by civic and service organizations, non-profits, businesses, internal departments and citizens are scheduled to be held in Town parks, facilities and other properties this year.

The “Events on Town Property” policy provides clear direction to event planners on how to apply for use of Town property and explains the rules and regulations they must abide by including Town Ordinances, insurance and liability requirements. The application allows the Town to collect information about the event’s need for logistics such as permits, public safety, traffic assistance, setting up the mobile stage and waste removal.

Applications, with a \$100 fee, are needed 120 days in advance of the special event date. The process helps avoid event schedule conflicts and helps the Town understand the scope of services and resources being requested by the organizer.

A special event is defined as a group activity including, but not limited to, a performance, meeting, assembly, contest, exhibit, ceremony, parade, athletic competition, reading, or picnic involving a set amount of people that may require additional Town resources and/or staff as well as a designated facility, space or other amenity of the Town that would be requested to be reserved in order to accommodate such activities. Typically, this would be a large-scale event open to the public. It does not include casual park use by visitors or individual rentals of shelters or Eaton Hall.

The policy and application are on the Town’s website and in both the Town Manager’s office and Brownsburg Parks. The events committee meets once each month to review and approve or deny requests, and determine what additional information is needed to ensure Town staff can effectively plan and provide support for events to ensure they will run smoothly and be successful.

## Hartsell Earns Credentialed Manager Designation

Assistant Town Manager Brian Hartsell received Credentialed Manager designation from ICMA, the International City/County Management Association. To receive the prestigious ICMA credential, a member must have significant experience as a senior management executive in local government; have earned a degree, preferably in public administration or a related field; and demonstrated a commitment to high standards of integrity and to lifelong learning and professional development.



## Do I Need A Permit for That?

As the weather warms up, we know many residents are considering making improvements to their properties. If you're among them, the Development Services Department can help with information about zoning restrictions and the need for permits.

Here are some common considerations:

**Accessory Structures:** Any accessory structure larger than 90 square feet requires a permit. The Town classifies accessory structures into three categories: storage-based, recreation-based and support-based. Each zoning district specifies which type or types of accessory structures are permitted. Accessory structures less than 90 square feet must still meet all applicable Accessory Structure Standards even though a permit is not required.

- Examples of storage-based accessory structures include mini barns, pool houses, sheds, barns, carports, detached garages, and greenhouses.
- Examples of recreation-based accessory structures include decks, gazebos, swimming pools, sports courts, pergolas, hot tubs, and ground-mounted satellite dishes.
- Examples of support-based accessory structures include concession stands, freestanding canopies, kiosks, maintenance facilities, and refrigeration or freezer units.

Accessory Structure Standards including permitted locations, setbacks, maximum number permitted are based upon each zoning classification.

**Fences:** The Town does not require permits for fences; however, there are regulations that must be followed. Fence and Wall Standards including permitted materials, locations and height are based upon each zoning classification.

## TIF-Area Businesses Eligible for Façade Improvement Grant

Brownsburg businesses located in or adjacent to the Town of Brownsburg's Tax Increment Financing (TIF) districts may now apply for a matching grant program to make façade improvements. In its second year, the Façade Improvement Grant program awarded more than \$100,000 to 10 established Brownsburg businesses in 2015 for exterior projects.

Part of the Town's Economic Development Incentive Policy, the grant utilizes TIF funds to match up to half of the project cost not to exceed \$15,000. Eligible work includes practically any exterior improvements that will be readily visible to the public, with the exception of routine maintenance activities. Restoring architectural details, painting, fixing or replacing windows and doors, installing awnings or canopies, perennial landscaping and plantings and lighting are some examples of eligible projects. The minimum project considered is \$2,000 for a matching grant of \$1,000.

Notices were mailed to businesses identified as eligible by the Town of Brownsburg. Applicants must be the property owner or the occupant with written consent of owner and the property must remain primarily commercial and be maintained for a minimum of three years following completion of the façade work.

The Façade Improvement Grant application is available on the Town's website. Proposals are being accepted through April 8. The Brownsburg Improvement Committee will review applications and make its recommendations to the Town Council. Funding award announcement has been tentatively set for June.

Eligibility requirements and complete guidelines are available in Section 3 of the Town of Brownsburg Economic Development Incentive Policy on the website.

## Decorate a Rain Barrel

The Town of Brownsburg's stormwater department is hosting a rain barrel decorating contest starting April 6. A \$25 entry fee gets participants a rain barrel to decorate, which will be theirs to keep and use at their home or business.

Collecting rain water to use for watering landscaping during the summer can cut household water use by up to half. Using a rain barrel helps you save water, energy and money and it helps keep our streams clean by reducing runoff and erosion.

The contest theme is "Where does the Stormwater Flow?" Contestants must provide their own decorating supplies that are able to withstand weather and outside elements. Designs must be appropriate for all ages. Decorated rain barrels need to be delivered to Town Hall by 4 p.m. on April 28. Barrels will be on display for voting at the Brownsburg Public Library from May 2 through 13.

## Microbeads Pollute our Water

Just washing your face can be water pollution if you use a cleaner with microbeads. The very small, uniformly sized plastic beads are in many consumer products like cosmetics, personal care products, face scrubs and toothpaste. Since microbeads are too small to be sifted out at wastewater treatment plants, they end up in our creeks, lakes and oceans.

Indiana is one of a few states that have banned the manufacture and sale of products containing microbeads. President Obama signed the Microbead Free Waters Act of 2015, banning the selling of microbeads in soaps & toothpaste by 2017.

## Combined Sewer Overflow Public Notice

The Town of Brownsburg, as part of the combined sewer overflow (CSO) notification program, hereby states that the potential for a combined sewer overflow into White Lick Creek during, and immediately following, any rain event or snow melt exists throughout the year. People who swim, wade in, or ingest the water contained in White Lick Creek at any time may become ill.

Wastewater discharges are disinfected during the months of April through October. All individuals should remain clear of White Lick Creek during the winter months regardless of the weather. The overflow discharges are located downstream of Arbuckle Acres, but upstream of Williams Park.

Individuals with property along White Lick Creek between Brownsburg and Plainfield may request a warning sign be posted along the creek bank of their property. For additional information or warning signs call 317-852-1114.

With record rainfall amounts occurring in July 2015, there was an increase in the number of overflow events occurring during July as well. Although flows were maximized to the wastewater treatment plant, the daily persistent rain events overwhelmed the capacity of the equipment which resulted in an increase in overflow events. The results for the remainder of 2015 reflected a similar number of events when compared to past years.

IDEM staff have meet with Brownsburg personnel and together developed a plan to follow for the next 5 years for the continued reduction in the number and volume of combined sewer overflow events. The plan includes the current installation of a storm pipe along Tilden Avenue which will separate the street stormwater runoff from the sanitary sewage flow coming from homes.

Continued sewer maintenance activities that the plan includes are: annual sewer cleaning, annual sewer televising, and annual sewer repair/lining goals. This sewer line maintenance assists the staff with maintaining the maximum capacity of the infrastructure as well as providing the information needed to prioritize & schedule future improvements.

## Storm Drain Marking Helps Discourage Improper Disposal

Did you know that storm drains do not purify and remove pollutants? In many communities stormwater runoff is discharged directly into nearby streams and other bodies of water are conduits to our groundwater.

The Town of Brownsburg has a storm drain marking program to identify the drains in neighborhoods and alert residents not to dump anything down the drain because it drains to a stream.


Storm drains are commonly misused for the disposal of waste such as paint, motor oil, antifreeze, pesticides and other pollutants. This improper disposal can seriously damage our community's water quality and environment.

In addition, each time it rains, stormwater runoff carries street litter and other pollutants into storm drains. This is called "nonpoint source pollution" and is a significant source of contamination of Indiana's water resources.

What residents do in the backyard makes a difference on your impact to the watershed. Here are some examples of what you can do at home:

- Keep storm water clean. Never dump litter, motor oil, animal waste or leaves into storm drains, catch basin, or waterways.
- Reduce impervious surfaces by using pavers or bricks rather than concrete for a driveway or sidewalk.
- Divert rain from paved surfaces onto grass to permit gradual infiltration.
- Choose the appropriate plants, shrubs, and trees for the soil in your yard; don't select plants that need a lot of watering, fertilizers or pesticides.
- Maintain your car properly so that motor oil, brake linings, anti-freeze, and other fluids don't contribute to water pollution.

Brownsburg scout troops, neighborhoods and civic organizations often help mark storm drains as part of their volunteer service. ## Take Advantage of Town's Free Curbside Limb Pickup

The Town of Brownsburg's curbside collection for branches and yard trimmings starts Monday, April 4. Residents may stack small branches and limbs in their yard behind the curb edge to take advantage of this free Town service.

The Street Department's wood chipper will be in your neighborhood every other week, Monday through Wednesday. Thursday and Friday are make-up days in the case that weather or other factors delay the schedule.

Collection times may vary, so it is recommended that stacks be along the curb by 7 a.m. on the neighborhood's scheduled recycle day.

## Call Stormwater Hotline to Report Illicit Discharge



It is unlawful to deposit, discharge, dump or otherwise permit substances, chemicals, or other materials in any storm sewer in the Town of Brownsburg. Materials prohibited include but are not limited to: petroleum products, grass clippings, fertilizer, paint, concrete, pet waste, pool water, and car wash water.

Call the Stormwater Hotline at 317-852-1121 if you have questions about a possible illicit discharge or if you see someone depositing any of the above materials in the storm sewer system, pond, stream or creek.
